Did You Know?

In the United States, 1 in 2 men and 1 in 3 women will develop cancer during their lives.¹

In the state of Oklahoma, 1 in 4 men and 1 in 3 women will be diagnosed with cancer.²

Oklahoma had the 17th highest rate of new cases of cancer in the United States in 2011.³

Over the past eight years, the cancer rate in the United States declined by three percent while Oklahoma's rate increased by seven percent.⁴

In calendar years 2011 and 2012, Mercy Hospital Oklahoma City diagnosed or treated approximately 1,800 new cancer cases per year, an annual increase of about 500 cases from 2010.

Breast cancer accounts for over 30% of Mercy's cancer cases. Mercy treats 22% of all new breast cancer diagnosed in the state of Oklahoma.
